



Terminal Tackle Sizing Charts

This handy chart offers basic sizing information for hooks, split-shot, swivels, snaps, split rings, and replacement spinnerbait blades.

Fishing hooks come in numbered sizes, and get larger as the numbered sizes get smaller. This continues to zero, at which point the "/0" display continues the trend. In this snip from VMC's catalog, notice that the size 8 is the smallest hook in the series, and the 8/0 ("eight aught") is the largest. The actual dimensions of a particular hook size may vary from style to style, but the same general trend will be present.




Treble hooks follow the same pattern, as seen here in another snip from VMC.




Fishing weights or sinkers are generally sold by weight, but small, pinch-on **split-shot weights** are designated by size, as indicated below in an image shared from Eagle Claw. These are small and relatively lightweight—the weight range below is from about 1/64 oz (BB) to about 1/9 oz (Size 2).



Most **swivels** follow the same comparative sizes as fishing hooks—larger numbers mean smaller sizes—but the standards here are not as established as they are with hooks. Look for other information, like "Lb Test" ratings on some products to help gauge sizes. (Higher Lb Test = larger swivel) Image shared from VMC catalog.



Most **snaps** are sized in standard numerical order, like these from VMC, but sometimes "Lb Test" ratings or even "small/medium/large" designations help distinguish sizing.



Split Rings are also usually sized numerically, like these from VMC.



Replacement **spinnerbait blades** are sized in standard numerical order, as shown in this image from Hildebrandt. A size 5 willow leaf blade will be about 2.5" in length, while a size 5 Colorado blade will be about 1.5" in length.
